Description du cours:

Le Français 2907A est un cours de langue qui s'adresse à des étudiant(e)s ayant déjà une bonne connaissance du Français écrit et oral. C'est un cours de composition française et d'explication de texte. Il vise à développer les techniques d'écriture et les stratégies de lecture et à renforcer la maîtrise du Français en général. Nous mettrons un accent particulier sur l'écriture et la lecture, la structure, la structure de la phrase, le style et le vocabulaire, sans oublier une révision systématique de la grammaire.

Nous demandons que les étudiant(e)s soient toujours en avance quant aux travaux de grammaire (surtout les exercices) et à la lecture.

Des exposés seront organisés pour améliorer l'expression orale. C'est ainsi que des présentations orales seront données par les étudiants pour enrichir la dimension orale du cours.

1. Rédactions (20%)

Les étudiants écriront **4 rédactions d'environ 400 mots**, qui seront soumises sur OWL. Elles devront faire preuve d'une certaine sophistication dans l'expression et d'une bonne compréhension du sujet traité. L'évaluation portera sur le fond et la forme : Développement du sujet, enchaînement des idées, bon usage de la grammaire, respect des règles de la composition, richesse du vocabulaire utilisé, originalité, etc.

2. Tests (30%)

Deux tests de compréhension seront donnés sur OWL. Chaque test couvrira le matériel qui aura été vu précédemment en classe, y compris le matériel des présentations orales.

Les tests seront faits sur OWL

3. Participation (5%) et Devoirs notés (5%)

La note de participation sera attribuée en fonction de l'assiduité de chaque étudiant (e) : Présence et participation aux activités de la classe et aux autres travaux que le professeur aura assignés. Ces travaux seront faits individuellement et ou en groupes.

Il y aura quatre devoirs qui seront remis pour être évalués et notés.

4. Présentations orales (10%)

Il y aura des présentations orales qui porteront essentiellement sur des éléments choisis de grammaire. Elles seront étendues sur une bonne partie du semestre. Ces présentations pourront être faites individuellement ou en groupes de deux, sur Zoom ou dans Forums (OWL)

5. Travail final (30%)

Ce travail sera fait en dehors de la période des examens. Il visera à demander à l'étudiant-e- de faire preuve de ses connaissances dans la production écrite, dans la manipulation des stratégies de l'écriture et dans la maîtrise langagière.

Academic Consideration for Student Absence

- for exams scheduled by the Office of the Registrar (e.g., December and April exams)
- absence of a duration greater than 48 hours,
- assessments worth more than 30% of the student's final grade,
- if a student has already used the self-reporting portal twice during the academic year

If the conditions for a Self-Reported Absence are *not* met, students will need to provide a Student Medical Certificate if the absence is medical, or provide appropriate documentation if there are compassionate grounds for the absence in question.

Students are encouraged to contact their Faculty academic counselling office to obtain more information about the relevant documentation.

Students should also note that individual instructors are not permitted to receive documentation directly from a student, whether in support of an application for consideration on medical grounds, or for other reasons. **All documentation required for absences that are not covered by the Self-Reported Absence Policy must be submitted to the Academic Counselling office of a student's Home Faculty.**
