Description et objectifs généraux du cours

Selon l'auteur de *Cher lecteur*, Georges Picard, « [1]es vrais livres ne délivrent pas un message, ils désarçonnent le lecteur, le dépaysent » (*Le Figaro*, 8 décembre 2017). Pour interroger cette affirmation tranchée et assez provocatrice, on se livrera à l'étude de trois écrits d'auteur.e.s contemporain.e.s en France dans lesquels s'établit une relation parfois perturbatrice aux lectrices et lecteurs ; à *des* publics et non pas à un public, comme Sartre le dirait peut-être. Ces écrits présentent une écriture ou narration prise dans une relation d'adresse. La question sera de savoir à quelles fins cette relation d'adresse fonctionne et (ce) qui est visé par elle. Les écrits à l'étude se contentent-ils de désarçonner ?

Les étudiant-e-s seront amené-e-s :

- -à approfondir leurs connaissances d'approche des textes littéraires, en rattachant les écrits, à l'étude dans ce cours, à la question de l'adresse, aux formes et enjeux de l'adresse
- -à acquérir une certaine familiarité avec certaines préoccupations socioculturelles et politiques de la France contemporaine (celles dont témoignent les textes à l'étude)
- à présenter leurs lectures de manière satisfaisante, au moyen de discussions en classe, dans des travaux argumentatifs ou d'analyse
