Description et objectifs généraux du cours

Ce cours a comme objectif de permettre à l'étudiant.e d'améliorer ses capacités (1) à identifier et analyser des pensées ou opinions dans un texte et (2) à exprimer sa pensée (à donner son opinion, à démontrer et à argumenter en français). Par le biais de lectures personnelles, d'exercices interactifs autocorrectifs et de travaux écrits, l'étudiant.e sera amené.e à:

- développer ses habiletés lexicales et syntaxiques en français;
- développer ses stratégies de compréhension, décortiquer des pensées ou opinions dans un texte;
- exprimer une opinion ou une pensée qui s'articule grâce à des arguments convaincants.
