COURSE DESCRIPTION

An introduction to contemporary generative syntax: lexical categories, morphology in relation to syntax, constituency, dependency, grammatical relations, argument structure. The primary language discussed will be English, but examples will be drawn from other languages where appropriate.

PEDAGOGICAL OBJECTIVES

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Know the basic syntactic terminology (e.g., specifier, adjunct, constituent, binding, X-bar rules, functional categories)
- Understand the basics of linguistic argumentation
- Understand a scientific approach to the study of sentence structure (i.e., observation of data → formulation of a hypothesis → testing the hypothesis with a new data → modifying initial hypothesis → testing it with data, etc.)
- Analyze data from a variety of languages proposing a sound syntactic analysis related to structure of phrases and sentences
- Evaluate different proposals of syntactic analysis
- Analyze word order in different languages
- Observe and describe linguistic variation

Important: Reading the textbook will not replace class lectures and discussions in class. In order to obtain a good mark, you should regularly attend classes.

NB: Students do not have the option of doing additional work to bring up their grade.

The final exam and *the midterm test* will present problem sets based on the material presented in class and in the book. Students will also be tested on their understanding of the theoretical concepts discussed in class. The midterm test and the final exam are cumulative.

Problem sets will be assigned regularly. It is important to do them individually without any extra help. If you choose to discuss them in a group, you will need to notify your instructor and write the names of all the students in your group on the first page of your assignment. Doing problem sets in class, in tutorials, and as part of your homework will help you to understand theoretical concepts and will prepare you for the test and the final exam.

Participation is your regular attendance and involvement in all classroom activities and discussion, as well as participation on Piazza. Class discussions will be incorporated throughout the class. Your regular contributions will help you better understand the studied topics and will play a significant role in your overall success in this course. To facilitate participation, the course will use iClicker technology, with participation assessed through completion of in-class questions. To get full marks for participation, a minimum of 80% of the questions must be answered. This recognizes that illness or other factors that affect attendance can be accommodated. Participation marks cannot exceed 100%.

SUBMISSION OF PROBLEM SETS

Problem sets must be submitted via OWL.

PENALTIES

Late assignments will lose 10% for each calendar day. Exceptions will be made only in the event of illness or other reasonable excuses (provided that the necessary documentation is submitted).

Grades cannot be adjusted for the reason of need (e.g. I just need two points), performance in other courses (e.g. I am an "A" student), poor performance due to illness or personal problems (unless documented and on file with the Academic Counseling Office of your Faculty).

COLLABORATION

If you decide to form a study group to work together on assignments, your collaboration should not go beyond discussing ideas together. In other words, you must write up your own assignment separately from the group, using only your own words (except when quoting other work directly, in which case use citations as standard). The following are all **banned** forms of collaboration:

- Having one or more members of the group produce a “group draft”, or “group essay plan”, which individual members of the group then customize.
- Writing up on separate computers while conferring with each other in real time (whether in person or via skype, chat services, or any other medium).
- Using another student’s complete assignment as a reference when completing your own.

Furthermore, when assignments are problem-set-based rather than essay-based, I encourage you to try to work alone, at least at first, before coming together with fellow students. Otherwise, it will be hard for you to tell how much you’ve really understood.

ADDITIONAL STATEMENTS

Statement on Use of Electronic Devices

During regular classes, the only allowable electronic device is a laptop computer or tablet and it should be used solely for the purpose of taking notes related to the class. Mobile phones, ipods, mp3 players, etc. must be turned off during class, except for use as iClickers. Electronic distractions will count against your participation mark. No electronic devices are allowed during the tests and exams.

1. Statement on Use of Personal Response Systems (“Clickers”)

Ling2248B will use iClickers, an audience response device. iClicker is Western’s officially-supported audience response system. It supports both virtual and physical clickers.

To use iClicker, you need to create an account. If you have previously used iClicker at Western you will use the existing account, but need to sign-in to iClicker Reef once per course, using the OWL portal.

Once your account is created, you can participate using iClicker using a ‘virtual clicker’ by way of a mobile app (Android or iOS mobile device) or web browser. These are free. Or you can purchase a physical clicker from The Book Store.

We will use the iClicker system to encourage participation and active learning. Questions posed using the system will provide you examples of the types of questions to be used on quizzes and the exam. The participation mark will be based on responses to questions using the iClicker system (the participation mark is based on a response, rather than a correct vs incorrect answer). See the section on Participation for how this component is evaluated.

iClickers can only be used by the account owner, clicker misuse (including use by a student other than the owner) is considered a form of [Scholastic Offence](#)

iClicker uses an external account. Student responses are anonymized when displayed. Responses associated with the participation mark are treated in a similar manner to all other marked components of the course and are only available to the student, instructor and TAs.

Guidelines for Students on the use of Personal Response Systems (“Clickers”)

Personal Response Systems (“clickers”) may be used in some classes. If clickers are to be used in a class, it is the responsibility of the student to ensure that the device is activated and functional. Students must see their instructor if they have any concerns about whether the clicker is malfunctioning.

Students must use only their own clicker. If clicker records are used to compute a portion of the course grade:

- the use of somebody else’s clicker in class constitutes a [scholastic offence](#),
- the possession of a clicker belonging to another student will be interpreted as an attempt to commit a [scholastic offence](#).
