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DESCRIPTION

This course is a survey of Friedrich Nietzsche's philosophical writings, including texts from his early, middle, and late periods. Among the topics to be considered are his critique of morality, his perspectivalism, his theory of aesthetic creation and artistic experience, his doctrine of eternal recurrence, and his declaration of the death of God.

TEXTS

The Nietzsche Reader, eds. Pearson/Large (Blackwell 2006)

(Additional primary and secondary material will be supplied during the course)

OBJECTIVES

Students completing this course successfully will (1) be familiar with the key works of one of the most enigmatic figures in the history of philosophy, (2) have demonstrated an ability to comprehend complex philosophical arguments and reflect critically upon them, and (3) be able to write concise argumentative papers exhibiting research competence.

REQUIREMENTS

Evaluation will consist in a combination of regular short assignments, a final research paper, and a participation mark.

Short Assignments

EVALUATION OF ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE

At least three days prior to the deadline for withdrawal from a course without academic penalty, students will receive assessment of work accounting for at least 15% of their final grade. For 3000- or 4000-level courses in which such a graded assessment is impracticable, the instructor(s) must obtain an exemption from this policy from the Dean and this exemption must be noted on the corresponding course syllabus. In rare instances and at the Dean's discretion, other courses could receive a similar exemption, which also must be noted in the course syllabus.
