That effective October 2011, the program be withdrawn and all registrations discontinued.

S.08-141 <u>English as a Second Language Program at Fanshawe in Lieu of Senate-Approved English</u> Language Proficiency Tests

That Senate approve that The University of Western Ontario accept the successful completion of Level Five of the Fanshawe English as a Second Language (ESL) program as demonstration of English language proficiency for admission to undergraduate degree programs in lieu of Senate-approved English Language Proficiency tests such as TOEFL, MELAB and IELTS, and that the University enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with Fanshawe, as shown in Exhibit III, Appendix 1, in this regard.

Referring to Figure 4, page 7, Proportion of First-Year Students from Other Countries, a member asked why Western experienced a drop in the number of international students. Mr. England stated that contributing factors include the increasing quality and number of Ontario applicants and the level of funding available for international recruitment. Dr. Davenport added that Western had deliberately reduced its intake of out-of-Province and international students in 2002-03 and 2003-04 in order to create more first-year places for Ontario secondary school students who were graduating as part of the double cohort. As of 2006-07 the trend has been reversed and is approaching the recent historical high of over five percent. Another factor is the growing availability of good undergraduate education in Asia and China which has led to a slow down generally of international students attending educational institutions across North America.

Asked about grade inflation, Mr. England stated that one can assume that there is some measure of grade inflation embedded in the movement of the Ontario model. Generally, however, demand for access to university education in Ontario continues to grow dramatically. Applications were up 6% this spring. Dr. Harris noted that the grade drop of the high school students finishing year one has not changed over the last decade.

Dr. Hewitt provided a brief overview of the Strategic Research Plan for 2008-2011, detailed in Exhibit V, Appendix 1, including "signature areas", and the inclusion of specific performance indicators around research funding.

With regard to the perception that some areas will feel excluded if not identified as signature areas, Dr. Hewitt said the definition of these areas and what they are meant to represent is absolutely critical. The University will not pursue ten areas to the exclusion of all others, rather the signature areas are those that currently distinguish Western nationally and internationally. The list of signature areas is based upon the Faculty Academic Plans submitted during the annual planning exercise.






